Praise God now and always for his compassion, his power, and his provision!

Psalm 145 is the only psalm designated as "a song of praise." It is the last psalm attributed to
David. It seems to indicate that David saved his best for last.

The psalm is an acrostic, with each verse beginning with a letter of the Hebrew alphabet ("n" is missing). Observant Jews would repeat the psalm three times a day, twice in the morning and once in the evening.
