## The Message of Christmas brings Comfort

Isaiah 40:1-31

Where do you turn for comfort when your expectations are not met? What do you rely on when life goes sideways? Comfort food? Alcohol or drugs? A favorite chair in front of the fireplace? A blanket or comforter? Professionals like a doctor or pastor?

Isaiah 40 is written to a nation in distress. The northern kingdom of Israel has been sent into exile by Assyria. The southern kingdom of Judah will be captured by Babylon in the near future. The people worry that God has forgotten them.

God tells the prophet Isaiah to comfort the people with a message of hope and deliverance. We discover that God provides the right kind of help just when we need it the most. He sends us a shepherd who delivers his people.

God is all-knowing and powerful (27-28)
God gives strength to those who need it most (29-31)
Principles to Practice
God comes to us as we are, where we are, in the wilderness and desert of our lives
God forgives our sins and meets our needs
We need to remove any barriers that keep us from seeing God's glory
God provides the strength we need when we need it most
Encourage others with the message of comfort that Jesus offers
